I don't believe that outdoor concerts are permitted in the CB district. The language you cite is from Sec. 31.6 of the zoning regulations. The term 'indoor' would apply to motion pictures, dramatic production and musical productions. Outdoor motion pictures, dramatic or musical productions are not permitted.

As for any of the Governor's Executive Orders given in relation to the Covid-19 pandemic, I don't know of any that overrides zoning restrictions in regard to outdoor concerts/events. I have attached the Covid-19 restrictions for outdoor events, which are in addition to and do not preempt local zoning controls.

As for TAHD and noise enforcement, please see the attached memo from TAHD. Basically, it eliminated its own noise regulations. However, noise complaints can still be made to TAHD which will enforce by relying on State regulations.

Morris also has a noise ordinance "reasonable noise", which is not very precise except that noise must be reasonable after 11 pm.

There is a line in our regulations for permitted uses in the CA and CB zone that regulation that reads:

Theaters for indoor motion picture projection or dramatic or musical productions.

It clearly specifies indoor for motion picture projection. It potentially leaves wiggle room for dramatic and musical productions to be outdoors. Regardless, how do you interpret this line? Additionally, do the COVID regulations play any role in this?

One other thing, who is the authority on noise these days? TAHD will accept complaints; however, they have rescinded their prior rules on noise. What authority do they refer to on this?
