Funding will also be allocated during the school year to support curriculum work, in collaboration with Dr. Siegel, our Associate Director of Innovation and Learning.

We are thrilled to have received grant approval for the Memorial School Project from the Department of Administrative Services, with the support of our legislators through special legislation. This project now enters its next chapter under the authority of the Building Committee. We have full confidence in the team's ability to deliver a new Memorial School that will meet the needs of all PreK-5th grade students in our district for decades to come.

We look forward to a successful 2025-2026 school year!

Policy Committee

Student Achievement Committee

The Student Achievement Committee focused this year on curriculum updates, instructional innovation, and student performance. Key efforts included piloting grade 4 math playlists, reviewing K-5 science and social studies, and expanding college-credit courses.

The committee analyzed assessment data (i-Ready, IXL, DIBELS, PSAT) with Dr Siegel to guide instruction and support student growth.

The district's curriculum handbook was restored, reviewed, and revised creating a streamlined process for curriculum revisions and new course proposals as the district heads toward a new strategic vision.

Several new high school courses were approved, including Experimental Design, Fire Science, Unified Health, Art of Teaching, Exercise Science, and E-Sports.

Classroom showcases highlighted enrichment, mathematics, robotics, and the arts. The committee looks forward to working with Dr. Leggett and Dr Siegel on the districtwide strategic planning process to support diverse programming, high academic achievement and growth along all grades levels.

Memorial School Project Renovation and Expansion

In August 2024 Durham and Middlefield voted to amend the Plan of our school district to allow for the consolidation of five schools into three. The plan amendment provides for the renovate as new and expansion of Memorial School to include all students In grades Prek-5th grade. It also allows for the eventual closure of Brewster and John Lyman schools with potential sales or repurposing of those buildings once the project is complete in 2027. Those building closures will be vital to working towards our goal to lower the per pupil expenditure in RSD13 as we focus on expenses for 3 schools Instead of 5.

A bond referendum in November 2024 passed the voters of Durham and Middlefield to fund the project. On this vote's passage the Board and administration worked diligently with the Department of Administrative Services and our state legislators to ask for special legislation under House Bill 7288 be included on the 2025 School Construction Priority List so that we could obtain grant approval and complete the first phase of this project this summer.

The project is now moving ahead in 5 separate phases which are explained below.

- Students will be relocated during construction with 4th grade joining at Lyman and 5th moving to Strong, enabling a faster, safer renovation process and saving over \$1.5 million while students can safely learn away from a construction zone.
- Over \$40 million in state reimbursement granted to this project helps safeguard our local taxpayers while modernizing a vital school facility.
- O&G and QA&M continue working in collaboration with the district and building committee to ensure swing space and subsequent phases are implemented smoothly and responsibly.

In the next few weeks the Building Committee and District Administration will be working on a dedicated page for the Memorial School Project where monthly information can be made available to view for the public on the exciting progress that is taking place! We will communicate that out through Parent Square when it is available!

Phases of the Project

1. Phase One - Swing Space: Grade 4 at Lyman, Grade 5 at Strong (nearing completion)

With Memorial School now closed to start the renovation and expansion of the building our contractors have been working hard all summer to create swing spaces to include 4th grade at John Lyman School and 5th grade at Strong School. The contractors are wrapping up their work at Strong School. At Lyman 2 leased portable classrooms are being delivered and installed as well as a renovation of the existing portables. To accommodate this timeline and ease disruption at the start of the year we have adjusted the school calendar for students to start after Labor Day weekend on September 3rd. The district administration will be communicating information for the start of the school year to include pickup and drop off protocols, school hours and student scheduling In the next few weeks. We are also happy to report that the fields at Memorial Field will still be accessible to our soccer youth league for this fall season.

2. Phase Two - Hazardous material remediation, selective demolition, and site work

Full Schematic Design of the site with O&G Industries, QA&M, and the Building Committee is nearing completion and on target for phase review with with the state to start remediation of hazardous material and select demolition that will allow for the full renovation and expansion.

- 3. Phase Three Full renovation and building addition
- 4. Phase Four Install fixtures, furniture, and technology
 - 5. Phase Five Install new playground equipment

Each phase will be carefully reviewed by the DAS as it moves forward and we look forward to O&G providing monthly updates to the public as their exciting work moves forward

BOE Building Committee: A Year of Action and Impact

Since the summer of 2024, the Regional School District 13 Building Committee has been consistently working to bring major improvements to our school facilities, athletic infrastructure, and long-term district planning. Their dedication and strategic focus are helping to modernize our schools while enhancing safety, functionality, and community access. Through every project large and small the Building Committee has exemplified diligence, foresight, and a shared commitment to excellence.

Their efforts ensure that our facilities not only meet today's needs but are positioned for tomorrow's growth. We are grateful for their hard work and continued partnership as we build a stronger future for RSD13.

Athletic Facilities and Fieldhouse Improvements

A major milestone this year has been the continued success of the fieldhouse and stadium lighting project, funded through a state grant. The Committee oversaw the installation of new lighting at the track, parking lot, and field areas improving visibility and safety for evening events and community use.

Remaining grant funds are being thoughtfully prioritized for further lighting enhancements at the complex to add lighting to the shotput area which is scheduled to be install in October.

Bathrooms in the fieldhouse are now functional and ADA compliant, and discussions continue around future enhancements and collaboration with the community, including heating, locker spaces, and expanded community access.









Planning for New School Construction

The Building Committee has played a critical role in the next phase of the district's future in planning for the construction of the new PK-5 School!

This has included reviewing RFQ/RFP responses for architectural, project management, and construction manager-at-risk services, conducting interviews, and partnering with QA+M Architects to develop swing space logistics, construction timelines with O&G Industries, and building design concepts. The Committee remains in close contact with the state to ensure compliance with construction reimbursement guidelines.



The CRHS track just finished a full resurfacing this summer and is now complete After thorough evaluation and core testing, the Committee approved a BSS100 polyurethane-based system expected to extend the life of the track by 10–12 years. The project also included a long-awaited color change (blue) and updated markings to enhance our track and field events

Tennis Court Assessments

For the tennis courts, ongoing issues with drainage and subsurface water pressure led to expert soil testing and engineering consultations. The Committee and BOE continues to weigh long-term solutions including a full reconstruction or post-tension concrete surface to address recurring cracking and bubbling. With limited funds currently set aside, this project remains on the radar for planning and potential town collaboration.



Campus and Safety Upgrades


Additional completed or in-progress work includes major paving and drainage upgrades on Pickett Lane and CRHS, sidewalk planning in partnership with the Town of Durham, and field maintenance work at the varsity baseball and softball fields.

The Committee has coordinated repairs, leveled infields, cleaned out drainage structures , and hydro-seeded previously problematic areas all while prioritizing Title IX equity and long-term sustainability.

Sprinkler systems at Strong and CRHS have been connected to the public water supply.
